

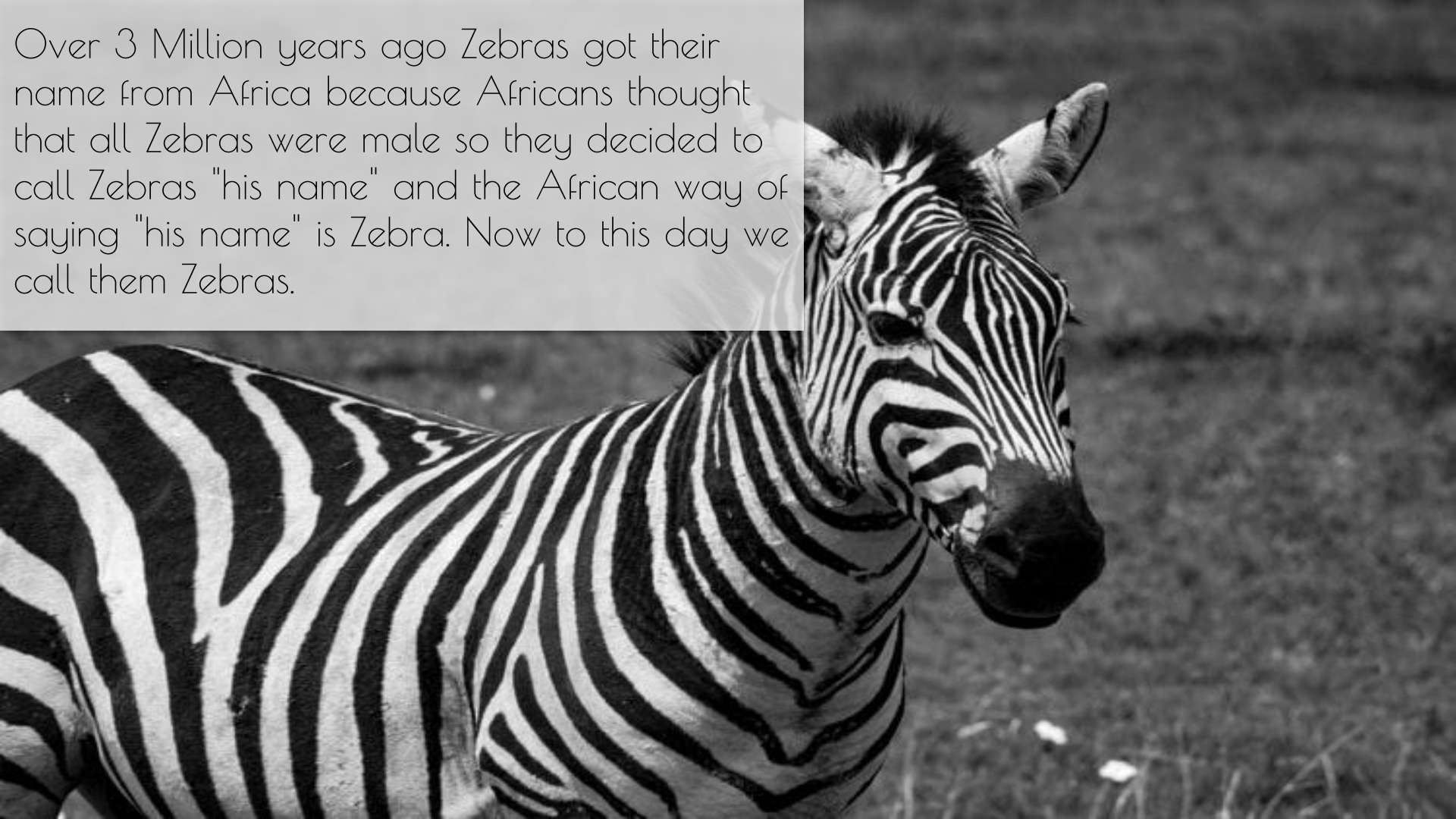

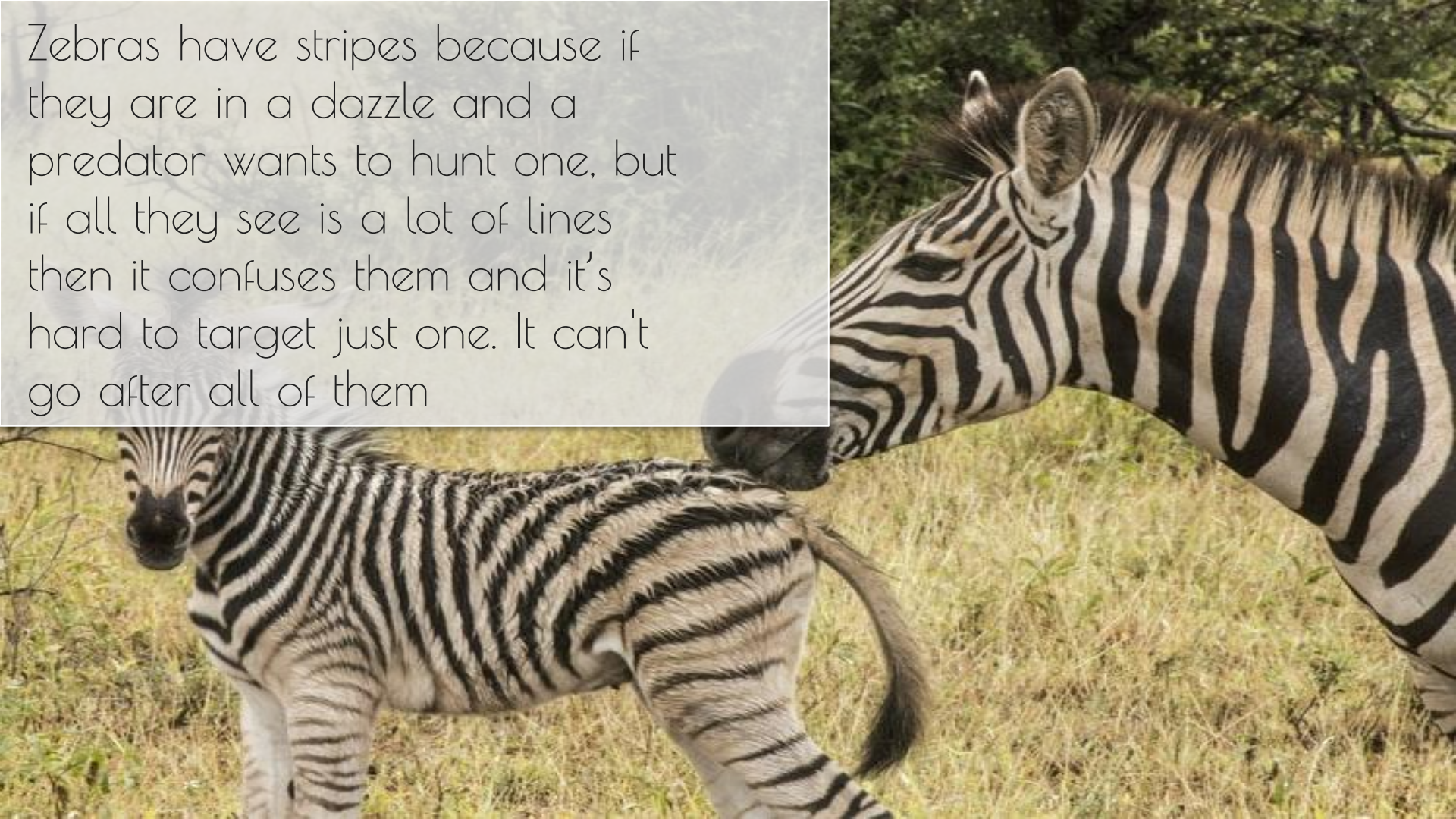
A Baby Zebra is
